Brainstorming Questions

Answer the following questions:

1. What is it going to take to achieve permanency for youth?

- Blake is in a foster home and his mother is engaged in the case plan. Permanency through reunification is the primary plan. Permanency through legal custody with kinship is the concurrent plan. Blake will be supported in exploring and participating in conversations about different permanency options with the concurrent planning. Reunification plan would need to include his mother having supports in place.

2. What can we try that we've NEVER tried before?

- Creating a genogram to include paternal side.
- Review genogram with Blake and explore reaching out to kin.
- Facilitate meeting with Blake's mother and current foster care provider to discuss Blake's current parenting needs and begin relationship building as an additional source of support for Blake's mother.

3. What can we try that HAS been tried?

- Circle back to maternal side of the family who have previously provided support to the family.
- Complete a new Circle of Supports with Blake and compare to the previous one completed 6 months ago.

4. What can we do concurrently?

- Talk with foster mother regarding her willingness to continue to be support to Blake and his mother or other kin in the event Blake reunified or transitioned to kin care.

5. How will we engage the youth?

- Approach the topics of discussion letting him know his voice is the center and he will be heard. Reinforcing the message regarding permanency and building in supports for Blake and his family.
